AHA CLUB COMPETITIONS

The American Homebrewers Association's Club-Only Competition program offers AHA registered homebrew clubs an opportunity to compete nationwide with other homebrew clubs. Each competition focuses attention on a specific style of beer or mead, giving clubs the opportunity to educate their members in these styles by focusing on them at club meetings or tasting events.

Upcoming competitions for 1999 have been scheduled as follows:

February: Category 23 - Specialty and Experimental Beers.

March: Category 2 - Belgian and French Style Ales (no lambics - these will be done in the year 2000).

May: Category 12 - Bock

August: Categories 25, 26 and 27 - Traditional Mead and Braggot, Fruit and Vegetable Mead, Herb and Spice Mead.

October: Category 9 - Porter

December: Category 10 - English and Scottish Style Strong Ales.

Please note that styles for club tastings are being coordinated with these competitions so that the club entries can be selected by the membership at a general club meeting rather than at a separate judging for each competition. If you have any questions on these competitions, please contact a club officer.

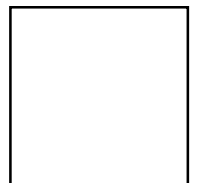
